

Mark Braden has practiced election law for nearly 50 years. He concentrates his work principally on the law of the political process, including work with election and campaign agencies, voting issues, redistricting, and ethics and lobbying regulations.

Mark spent 10 years as chief counsel to the Republican National Committee prior to joining BakerHostetler. He is widely recognized for his knowledge of state election laws, having served as chief counsel to the Ohio Elections Commission and election counsel to the Ohio Secretary of State. Mark has played a significant role in the redistricting process nationwide. He has been a principal lawyer in many of the largest recounts in political history, including recount and contest litigation in Ohio, Pennsylvania, Indiana, California, North Carolina, Virginia, Illinois, New Jersey, Washington and New Mexico. In 2025, Mark successfully defended the North Carolina and Texas legislatures' new congressional redistricting maps.

Mark is a former member of the adjunct faculty of George Washington University and Catholic University, and former special election law counsel to the United States House of Representatives' Administration Committee. He has testified before congressional committees and the Federal Election Commission, and his experience in the legal and political arenas has resulted in invitations to lecture at universities and institutes nationwide. He has authored *International Election Principles: Election*, Chapter: "Early and Absentee Voting" (ABA Publishing, 2009) and *Election Reform in the United States after Bush v. Gore*, eds. Grofman & Alvarez, Chapter: "Entering the Political Thicket" (Cambridge University Press, 2013).
